Use of Transport	Staff Students Others	Infection Control	 It is recommended that facemasks are worn in enclosed and crowded spaces where you may come into contact with people you don't normally meet. This includes public transport and dedicated transport to school. It is important to ensure vehicles are well ventilated when occupied, by opening windows and ceiling vents. The need for increased ventilation while maintaining a comfortable temperature should be balanced. 	MED	✓



 On dedicated transport: It is recommended that children and young people aged 11 and over continue to wear a face covering when travelling to secondary school or college. It is no longer recommended maximising distance and minimising mixing, but unnecessary risks such overcrowding should be minimised. Children, young people and adults should follow public health advice on when to self-isolate and what to do. They should not board dedicated transport or public transport if they have symptoms or other reasons requiring them to stay at home due to the risk of them passing on COVID-19. If a child or young person develops COVID-19 symptoms, however mild, while at the academy, they will be sent home. They should avoid using public transport and, wherever possible, be collected by a member of their family or household. In exceptional circumstances, if parents or carers cannot arrange to have their child collected, and it is age-appropriate and safe to do so, the child should walk, cycle or scoot home. If this is not possible, alternative arrangements may need to be organised by the academy. All classrooms to have antibacterial wipes and if necessary to radio for a member of cleaning staff to attend. Regular cleaning of surfaces will reduce the risk of spreading the virus. All used cloths thrown away to be double bagged and then placed in a secure area i.e. lockable bin. If mechanical ventilation systems are used to draw fresh air or extract air from a room these should be adjusted to increase the ventilation rate wherever possible. Ensure that mechanical ventilation systems only circulate fresh outside air and where this is not possible, in a single room supplement with an outdoor air supply. 	MED	✓



			 Where appropriate open external windows, internal doors and external doors to improve natural ventilation. If external doors are opened, ensure that they are not fire doors and are safe to do so. 		
Poor hygiene practice	Staff Students Others	III Health	 You should continue to ensure that children clean their hands regularly, this can be done with soap and water or hand sanitiser. Hand sanitiser will be placed in all classrooms and at student reception and main reception. Staff and visitors are encouraged to wash their hands with soap or alcohol-based sanitiser (that contains no less than 60% alcohol) and follow infection control procedures in accordance with the DfE and PHE's guidance. Sufficient amounts of soap (or hand sanitiser where applicable), clean water and paper towels are supplied in all toilets and kitchen areas. Students are supervised by staff when washing their hands to ensure it is done correctly, where necessary. Students are discouraged from sharing cutlery, cups or food. All cutlery and cups are thoroughly cleaned before and after use. Cleaners to carry out daily, thorough cleaning that follows national guidance and is compliant with the COSHH Policy and the Health and Safety Policy. Any Student or member of staff who displays signs of being unwell, such as having a cough, fever or a loss or change to their sense of smell or taste, and believes they have been exposed to coronavirus, is immediately taken out of the class and placed in an area where they will not come into contact with others and are supervised at all times. For Students, the relevant member of staff calls for emergency assistance immediately if Students' symptoms worsen. The parents of unwell Students are informed as soon as possible of the situation by a relevant member of staff. Where contact with a Student's parents/carers 	
 away from others. Areas used by unwell staff and Students who need to go home are appropriately cleaned once vacated, using a disinfectant and care to be taken when cleaning all hard surfaces. If unwell Students and staff are waiting to go home, they are instructed to use different toilets to the rest of the Academy to minimise the spread of infection. Any Students who display signs of infection are taken home immediately, or as soon as practicable, by their 	



			 contact NHS 111 immediately or call 999 if the Student becomes seriously ill or their life is at risk. Any members of staff who display signs of infection are sent home immediately and are advised to contact NHS 111 immediately or call 999 if they become seriously ill or their life is at risk. Any medication given to ease the unwell individual's symptoms, e.g. Paracetamol, is administered in accordance with the Administering Medications Policy. 		
Secondary Age Students Asymptomatic testing Autumn Term	Students Staff	Infection Control	 All secondary Students should receive 2 on-site lateral flow device tests, 3 to 5 days apart, on their return in the Autumn term. MCA will commence testing from 2nd September and will not stagger return of Students across the first week but will have a year 7 Induction day prior to all students returning. Students should then continue to test twice weekly at home until the end of September, when this will be reviewed. New intake of year 7 will be offered the 2 tests at an ATS at the beginning of the Autumn term when they start at their secondary Academy. Academies should also retain a small asymptomatic testing site (ATS) on-site until further notice so they can offer testing to Students who are unable to test themselves at home. Staff should undertake twice weekly home tests whenever they are on site until the end of September when this will be reviewed. 	MED	√



Positive Cases	Students Staff	Infection control	 The Academy no longer need to do contact tracing as close contacts will be identified via NHS Test and Trace. The Academy will support NHS Test and Trace when required to help identify close contacts. From 16th August 2021 From 16 August 2021, children under the age of 18 years old will no longer be required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact of a positive COVID-19 case. Instead, children will be contacted by NHS Test and Trace, informed they have been in close contact with a positive case and advised to take a PCR test. We would encourage all individuals to take a PCR test if advised to do so. Over 18 years of age 18-year-olds will be treated in the same way as children until 6 months after their 18th birthday, to allow them the opportunity to get fully vaccinated. At which point, they will be subject to the same rules as adults and so if they choose not to get vaccinated, they will need to self-isolate if identified as a close contact. Continue to have a role in working with health protection teams in the case of a local outbreak. If there is an outbreak in a setting or if central government offers the area an enhanced response package, a director of public health might advise a setting to temporarily reintroduce some control measures 	MED	✓

Staff are vigilant and report concerns about their own, a colleague's or a Student's symptoms to the Principal or SLT as soon as possible. The Academy is consistent in its approach to the management of suspected and confirmed cases of coronavirus. The Academy is informed by Students' parents/carers when Students return to the academy after having coronavirus – the Academy informs the relevant staff. Staff inform the Principal when they plan to return to work after having coronavirus. ATT Estates Dept monitors the cleaning standards of all cleaning contractors and discusses any additional measures required with regards to managing the spread of coronavirus. 	01-4		Contingency framework: education and childcare settings (publishing.service.gov.uk) The thresholds, detailed below, can be used by settings as an indication for when to seek public health advice if they are concerned. For most education and childcare settings, whichever of these thresholds is reached first: ➤ 5 children, Students, students or staff, who are likely to have mixed closely, test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period: or ➤ 10% of children, Students, students or staff who are likely to have mixed closely test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period. • All settings should seek public health advice if a Student, student, child or staff member is admitted to hospital with COVID-19 by phoning the DfE helpline (0800 046 8687, option 1), or in line with other local arrangements. Hospitalisation could indicate increased severity of illness or a new variant of concern. Settings may be offered public health support in managing risk assessments and communicating with staff and parents. • Settings may wish to seek additional public health advice if they are concerned about transmission in the setting.
