

#### **Health and Social Care Trip**




On Thursday 8th December the Year 13 Health and Social Care students headed out on a trip to support their learning on Nutrition for Health.

AJ Thomas- Butters won with 41cm, closely followed by Jacob Weller and Miss Bird.


Science club are currently working on trying to find the best bath bomb recipe.




## **GCSE Astronomy Club Launched**

## **School Fire Liaison Officer**



Dear All

My name is Pete, and I am the new 'School Fire Liaison Officer' here at MCA. I am a fulltime firefighter working for Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service at Bury St Edmunds Station. There I work a shift pattern of 4 days on followed by 4 days off. These comprise of two-day shifts and two-night shifts. I also work as a retained firefighter at Newmarket Fire Station, and I am on-call for the remaining hours of the week.

Here at MCA, I am keen to work alongside the students and help in their day-to-day learning environment as well as mentor students who need additional support. I will also be working with some of the students at Mildenhall Fire Station to help them develop through practical scenarios that firefighters carry out on a daily basis. These practical and teamwork skills will closely follow MCA's 'TRAITS.' and assist in their everyday lives.

I am looking forward to working with many students across the different year groups and helping them with their individual needs and aspirations. My hope is that they enjoy working with me and gain from the time I spend at MCA.

It is the time of year to celebrate Christmas and decorate the house with lights, trees, and other seasonal items. Remember to unplug lights when leaving the house during the day and before you go to bed. Ensure that you do not overload plug sockets or extension leads as this could result in electrical faults, which can cause fires.

One very important thing to remember is to water your Christmas tree! If you like to buy a fresh tree, please ensure that you stand it in a pot that allows you to regularly water it. Central heating can very quickly dry the tree, leaving it completely void of moisture. Should a Fault with the lights cause a fire the tree will become fully engulfed in flames within seconds causing a fully developed fire within your house. The link below shows the difference between a watered tree and a tinder dry tree with the same electrical fault resulting in a fire. This video is not meant to worry you at this time of year but to consider the safety of you, your loved ones and your property. Merry Christmas and stay safe.





## Sixth Form Battlefields Trip



At the end of November, 23 sixth form students had the opportunity to travel to Belgium in order expand their knowledge of the First World War as well as learning the true story of the Christmas Truce.

During day one, we visited many different Commonwealth War Grave Cemeteries including Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery, Langemark German War Cemetery as well as visiting Talbot House and Hill 62 (trenches). At each cemetery, we had the chance to walk around and see the vast range of different regiments and nationalities as well as learning the stories of a few individuals who unfortunately lost their lives. One story that stuck out was that of Nurse Nellie Spindler. Nellie is one of two women to be buried in a Belgian war cemetery after being transferred to Lijssenthoek clearing hospital but sadly lost her life in a shell bombardment, making the visit to her grave even more poignant as we saw the extensive range of people involved in the Great War.

On the first night, we travelled to Ypres where we had some free time and an

appetising meal before walking over to Menin Gate to see the Last Post Ceremony. Every day since the end of World War One, the road at Menin Gate has been closed to allow the Last Post Association to play the humbling bugle call with it being followed by a short wreath-laying service. As a sixth form, two students were chosen to take a moment of reflection by laying the wreath which had a message reading, "Named or unnamed, friend or foe, to the world, you shall ALL be forever remembered." For everyone, the experience of hearing the call of the last post was touching as it accentuated the travesties of war and showed how it should still be remembered today.

The next day was similarly packed full of meaningful and exciting stops as we ventured to learn the true story of the Christmas truce. One of our first stops was the biggest war cemetery in Belgium, Tyne Cot, which is home to over 10,000 graves as well as accommodating a memorial with the names of over 35,000 soldiers whose graves are unknown. During our time at Tyne Cot, we learnt how to read a commonwealth war grave and had time to find different inscriptions written on the gravestones. Although many graves remained without words, some stood out with their personal touches and sweet commemorations. For example, the grave of Rifleman G.O. Smith read, "life is very sweet brother who would wish to die" showing how cruel life was in the war and how we should be grateful for those who fought for our country.

Away from Tyne Cot, we took a walk to Prowse Point which is where the Christmas Truce of 1914 took place, and we learnt about the events leading up to the truce. We discovered that despite there not being a full football match as many stories suggest, there was a general feeling of amicability in the trenches as German and British soldiers came together to talk, exchange goods, cut each other's hair and just have a break whilst on the front line. It was impactful to learn out the general brotherliness between the two sides during the truce yet also saddening to know that their expectations of war being over by Christmas were far from true and in years to come, these truces became less and less.

On the final day, we travelled to Bruges where we visited the Christmas Market. Throughout the day we all enjoyed some traditional Belgian delicacies as well as being able to start our Christmas shopping and immersing ourselves into the Christmas spirit.

Overall, the trip was a truly sobering experience which opened our eyes to the atrocities of the war and how it not only shaped history but how it has also impacted our lives today.



#### **U14 Basketball**






