


Curriculum Content	Students will learn what a stereotype is and how they are portrayed. Students will then apply this knowledge to Sitcoms.	Students will develop their evaluation skills through analysing and evaluating a professional performance – Peter Pan by the National Theatre. Students will be introduced to semiotics and how this is used in performance. Students will be taught how technical elements of a performance can be used to create meaning.	Students will explore how we can add 'magic' to our performances by adding in techniques and strategies to engage the audience. Throughout each lesson, students are introduced to new techniques by using the theme of 'magic' and Harry Potter to help them.

Sitcom

Situation Comedy

A television programme which includes stereotypical characters.

Performance Skills

- Speak loudly and clearly
- Never have your back to the audience
- Use the 5 main acting skills clearly
- Show a clear character and stereotype
- Comedic timing
- Clarity of movements and gestures
- Direct address to audience

Stereotype

a widely held but oversimplified image or idea of a particular type of person.

Stereotypes are not necessarily a true reflection of the person.

Self Evaluation

Making judgements about the success of your performance.
Using specific examples from your performance to justify your judgement.
Identifying areas of strength and

improvement.

Sitcom Knowledge

- The characters stay the same each episode but the 'situation' changes.
- Stereotypical characters are used so that the audience can relate to them.
- Stereotypical characters and situations makes the audience laugh.
 - There must be a problem/issue to solve in the middle of the episode.
