














## 'Masters of the Air' Premiere



We were very privileged to be invited to the world premiere of the new Apple TV series, Masters of the Air which was shown at RAF Mildenhall, a full week before it was premiered in London. Masters of the Air follows the exploits of a section of the American Airforce during World War Two - the 'Bloody Hundredth'. These airmen were the direct predecessors of the 100th Refueling Wing who now fly from RAF Mildenhall today, which was why we were so privileged to watch the series early.

We would like to thank Mr Lowis and RAF Mildenhall for allowing us to go and see the film. After writing a letter to explain why we should go, we were lucky to be selected for the trip. This trip has built on what we have been learning about in our Year 9 History lessons concerning

the Second World War. The show was being shown a number of times during the day, but we were able to go to the very first showing at 10:00 am. When we got to RAF Mildenhall we shook many important people's hands, had our photo taken and were given the best seats in the Movie Theatre. As well as getting a range of snacks, we were asked to pick winning tickets from some of those in the theatre! After the show we were officially interviewed outside and asked about our opinions of the show.

The Air Base Commander, Colonel Ryan Garlow, introduced the show and he was as excited as we were to watch the episode. Before it came on, there was even a personal message to the current 100th Refueling Wing at RAF Mildenhall from the Masters of the Air series

## 'Masters of the Air' Premiere

Executive Producer, Gary Goetzman, highlighted the important lineage from the Second World War to today. The actual episode was really cool and interesting and we highly recommend watching it.

The horrors that the American military went through during the Second World War can only be described as 'more than gruesome'.





At the end of the show the Chief Master Sergeant, Tiffany Griego, quoted a line from the episode – before their first mission a B17 crew were told that they were trained, prepared and ready and now needed to put this into practice as they flew. She reminded the audience that this was still just as relevant to the aircrews today – that they need to be prepared for action whenever and wherever they are asked to go. To watch Masters of the Air with the current airmen and women of the 'Bloody Hundredth' made for a very surreal and poignant atmosphere. We were watching their history, but it also linked to the importance of what RAF Mildenhall does today. Once again, we would like to thank RAF Mildenhall for the invite to this very special event.

## **Tower of London Trip**



On Thursday 1st February, a company of 40 students and 5 MCA teachers made their way to our nation's capital to take-in the historic sites.

We left the academy at 9:45am to arrive at about 11:45am. We walked to the Tower of London and found a spot to have our lunch.

After lunch, Mr Lowis split us up into groups of 10. I was in Mr Lowis' group. At the Tower of London there were four main sights to see; the Bloody Tower, the Crown Jewels, The White Tower and the 'Gory Story' Wall Walk.

Thankfully, there were no executions planned that day, the last one at this

site was back in 1941.


After having a look inside the Tower of London we came back as one large group and began our Tudor and Stuart walking tour of four historic sites around the city of London.

The first was The Monument on Pudding Lane where the Great Fire of London started in 1666. The fire originally started in a bakery owned by a man called Thomas Farriner, who did not put his oven out correctly. The fire spread throughout London and went on for 5 days. After that we walked across London Bridge to the Golden Hinde, a replica of Sir Francis Drake's ship. He is known for circumnavigating the world between

1577 and 1580. He is also famous for helping to defeat the Spanish Armada in 1588.

The third historic site we visited was the Globe theatre. The Globe is where Shakespeare's plays were performed and is still being used today. The original Globe burned down in 1613 from a theatrical prop misfiring – the one today is a replica.

The final site we stopped at was St Pauls Cathedral which also burnt down, this time during the Great Fire. During the fire, men and women placed their belongings in the cathedral in the hope that God would protect the cathedral and everything in it. However this did not work and the cathedral went up in flames along with everything in it. However the church was rebuilt and this 'new' church did survive the Blitz during the Second World War.

After our walk, we went to a McDonalds across the street and had our dinner there. We then headed to the Vaudeville Theatre where we watched 'SIX the musical'. SIX retells the story of Henry VIII's wives, each of the wives tells their version of HER-STORY and compete in song for who has been treated the worst

by Henry. At the end, they discover they all have been treated badly and should not fight amongst themselves. Once we found our seats, we sat down to watch the show. The show finished at 9:30pm and we got on the bus at 9:40pm to then return home at midnight.

A fun filled day had by all! I am sure that the next group of Year 8s going in March will have just as good a time as we did!

Whilst we know there is a long way to go, we are committed to trying to show girls that there is a rewarding career at the end of learning about computing.

MCA successfully completed all aspects of the programme to achieve the I Belong Programme certificate. The evidence informed programme signposts to a range of activities and approaches most likely to support girls' engagement with the subject.

Mr Sexton attended a celebration event in London on Tuesday 6th February to collect our certificate for being one of the first schools to demonstrate our commitment to improving the gender balance.

The I Belong: encouraging girls into Computer Science programme is part of the National Centre for Computing Education's (NCCE) support to schools and colleges.

It is free for teachers in state-funded education and designed to help schools understand the barriers to girls' participation in Computer Science and form a plan to overcome them.



### **Lessons from Auschwitz**

The trip to Poland with the Holocaust Educational Trust was an emotional and educational experience.



Before travelling to Auschwitz I and Auschwitz-Birkenau, we visited the town of Oświecim and were able to learn about pre-war Jewish life there. While in the town, we visited the Market Square and made comparisons between the location in 2024 and the location pre-1939. While doing this, we discovered that the Synagogue we could see in the images had been destroyed by the Nazis when the town was occupied. We also discovered that both Christians and Jews lived peacefully with one another - even celebrating their respective holidays together - until the Nazis forcibly removed the Jewish population from the town. However, we also learned about centuries of anti-Semitism experienced by Jewish people across Europe.

After visiting the town, we travelled just ten minutes to reach the site of Auschwitz I. During the time at Auschwitz I, we were educated by a Polish guide who re-told the history of Auschwitz I, alongside the evidence of the crimes committed by the

Nazis. Some of this evidence included shoes, bags, clothing and hair that was taken from the prisoners.

These rooms were filled with the horrors of the reality of the Holocaust and words cannot describe the emotions that were mutually felt by everyone in the room. As well as viewing the evidence of crimes, we were able to view projections of Jewish life before World War II, showing individuals who suffered brutal persecution at the hands of the Nazis and their collaborators. In this room you could feel the happiness felt by the people in the projections, laughing and dancing with their loved ones, and this further increased the intensity of emotions felt by everyone. It was here that we also walked through the gas chambers that were used for mass-killings.



### **Lessons from Auschwitz**

When we had finished our time at Auschwitz I, we travelled to Auschwitz-Birkenau, where we saw the views of what 1.1 million people saw before their lives were stripped from them. Here we viewed the barracks that the labour prisoners lived in. Hundreds of prisoners would be placed into one of these barracks and were expected to rest well enough to work efficiently. After viewing the barracks, we walked alongside the train tracks to view a model cart of what prisoners would be transported in. Walking alongside the tracks is a moment that really stood out because I could feel my privilege and freedom here, having the choice to walk alongside these tracks and not to actually be in the camp - unlike the 1.3 million who were forced to travel to Auschwitz-Birkenau.

At the end of our time at Birkenau, we held a memorial ceremony to commemorate all of the victims of the Holocaust. As a part of this ceremony, we were able to listen to a prayer from Rabbi Epstein, a Rabbi who travelled alongside us to Poland. This prayer was sung to us in Hebrew, and this was another moment that has stood out to me.

By visiting Auschwitz I and Birkenau,
I have become a witness to the
crimes committed by the Nazis and
have expanded my knowledge of the
Holocaust. With this knowledge, I am
going to educate others and breakdown
misconceptions about the Holocaust,
as well as continue to learn about the
Holocaust and remember the victims who
suffered the most extreme persecution

imaginable. We have also had the opportunity to hear the experiences of a Holocaust survivor in a follow-up seminar and this has helped us to put into perspective what



individual victims suffered at the hands of the Nazis.

#### **U14 Boys Football**

On Thursday 18th January, the Year 9 boys were knocked out of the Suffolk Cup with a 6-1 loss to Kesgrave. Having beaten Kesgrave in the Suffolk Cup final last year, the boys went into the game full of confidence.

Unfortunately, we struggled to deal with the constant long balls over the top, which was leaving Ben Cross with a lot to do 1 on 1 with their strikers, nonetheless, there was nothing he could have done. Mildenhall saw most of the ball throughout most of the game, with Robin Munro, Bailey Gibbs and Henry Edwards looking threatening. He eventually got what he deserved, after taking the ball from the halfway line through a number of Kesgrave defenders, before striking the ball into the far top right corner of the goal. The match ended a couple of minutes early, due to an injury to one of the Kesgrave players, however it wasn't as bad as it first seemed, as he was doing well the following day. Mildenhall showed good spirit and battled hard throughout the game, however it resulted in their first loss since Year 7. The boys should be proud of their continued efforts.



We are not able to offer medical care beyond this as we do not have the medical expertise or facilities to do this. In these instances we will contact you for a decision about whether your child comes home or stays in the academy. We try to encourage students to remain in the academy accessing their learning unless they are too unwell.

In any eventuality students must go to student reception for us to contact you and not make contact themselves as mobile phone use is not permitted. If your child has a long term or temporary condition affecting their ability to be in the academy as normal or where we need to be aware for their safety and comfort please contact your child's House Leader who will arrange a meeting and where necessary an individual health care plan.
