
It was great fun and of course the cakes and sandwiches went down very well!





San Francisco Trip

This was MCA's first visit back to San Francisco after Covid. The aim of this trip is to inspire students to think beyond Mildenhall and the local area and expose



them to new things. Students also develop their independence, being so far from their families.

Saturday

We left MCA bright and early (around 7am) on Saturday 17th February and managed to get through security very easily at Heathrow. This gave students and staff a chance to get some food (including lots of sweets and sugary drinks) and relax for the journey ahead. We had a few nervous students but they soon settled into the flight and spent it chatting, playing games and watching films.

We landed in San Francisco around 4pm local time, getting to the hostel around 6pm. This gave everyone a chance to freshen up after checking in before taking a stroll down to Pier 39 where we had dinner booked at Bubba Gump's.

Sunday

Sunday was our first full day in San Francisco. The plan was to visit Six Flags theme park for a day to work out the jet lag. On the way to Six Flags, we crossed the Golden Gate bridge for two photo opportunities, one on each side of the bridge. After the brief stops, it was time to head to Six Flags. Unfortunately, bad weather in the area meant that management decided that they had to shut the park for the day just as we arrived.

Gales and severe downpours were forecast and with the unpredictable nature of San Francisco weather, they made the difficult decision with little warning. Staff and students started to look at the alternatives. With the other parks in the area making similar decisions, we decided to go to the popular San Francisco Zoo. Students had the chance to visit the animals and with it being around the time of the Chinese New Year, there was even a parade in honour of the occasion. We finished the day with some shopping at a local shopping centre before heading back to the hostel and then onto the Hard Rock Café for dinner.

Monday

On the Monday, we took a walking tour around the city. We were met by a tour guide just outside the hostel and we jumped on a series of buses up to The Painted Ladies (some Victorian homes which have appeared in several TV shows and films. There were great views of the city from here.

From here, we took buses back towards the main part of the city where we visited China Town and Little Italy, finding out about the history of these places and seeing some of the architecture. Our tour guide was very knowledgeable and we ended the tour at a local mall for students to do a little bit more shopping. Afterwards, we took the cable car back towards Pier 39 where we ate at Bubba Gump's again. Students were given a bit of free time around the pier before dinner.

Tuesday

On Tuesday, we had a packed agenda. Starting out at Stamford University, we took a tour around the campus where we viewed several different buildings and having a look at sites of interest such as the main chapel, the computer science building and the oval. Our next stop was to the TECH interactive museum which is full of various exhibits linked to Science and Technology. Most of the exhibits are interactive and allowed the

students to learn through fun. Following on from this, we visited the Apple visitor centre where the students were invited to use iPads to use Augmented Reality to find out about the Apple campus, where most Apple's developments are created. We rounded off the day visiting the homes where Apple and HP were founded. These were brief stops due to the fact they are in residential neighbourhoods.

Wednesday

Our final full day was another packed day in Silicon Valley. It started with a trip to Electronic Arts (EA) where our hosts put on an incredible tour of their facilities. We started with an introduction into the building. The main purpose of the studio is to develop the Sims game. Our host took our students through some of the recreational facilities that the employees get to enjoy before visiting some of the staff at EA. We visited their esports broadcasting centre to find out how esports is covered before we spoke to the Sims Sound Effects Team and Managers to find out how the games are made.

We followed this up with a trip to the NASA gift shop for a chance to get some souvenirs before spending time at the Computer History Museum where students were able to wander around the museum to understand how technology has developed. Exhibits included early 'computers' as well as some crazy inventions that never made it to manufacture.

We finished the day visiting Google's new Bay View campus. This is an incredible facility that they spent billions of dollars putting together using feedback from employees to develop the best possible workspace. Facilities within the building include, open plan workspaces, offices, areas to relax as well as some sleep pods.

Thursday

Our last day in San Francisco started with a trip to Alcatraz. We took a ferry over to the island where we took an audio tour around the prison finding out about the history of the prison and its uses. There was a chance to see how prisoners lived by viewing different cells and we heard about some of the most infamous prisoners like Al Capone as well as stories about attempted prison breaks.

Following this we spent time on Pier 39 for the final time before heading back to the hostel to get the coach for our airport transfers.

Legoland Trip



As part of our push to help Year 9 students understand some of their GCSE options in the Business, Health and Computing faculty, we organised a trip to Legoland. 146 Year 9 students attended the trip which was more popular than initially anticipated.

Students were assigned to either a Computing workshop or a Business workshop. Each workshop lasted 45 minutes and students were then able to spend the rest of the time wandering the park.

The Computing workshop taught students how to program using the Lego Spike robots. Students were given a brief to build and decorate their robot first and then taught some basic instructions to get the robot moving. They are then tasked with solving a problem of moving the robot from one location to another. Lots of students then found out how to add sounds to their program which they then included with their 'victory dances'.

The Business workshop focused on some key aspects of the GCSE Business Studies exams which are also important to how Legoland runs. Students learned about marketing and the strategies that Legoland uses and also about the financial side of running a theme park. This workshop gave students a real insight into what GCSE business studies looks like.

Students (and Staff) enjoyed the remainder of their time wandering the park, going on rides and looking at the impressive Lego models. From a computing point of view, Sky Lion was incredible and no trip to Legoland would be complete without a ride on the dragon rollercoaster. Plenty of Lego was bought from the shops at the end of the day, with one student buying and building an impressive Bowser model.

The student feedback from the trip was extremely positive with students indicating that they really enjoyed being trusted to go around the park in their friendship groups and taking part in the workshops. We will be organising the same trip for the current Year 8 students next year.

The Duke of Edinburgh silver students undertook their practice expedition from Friday 15th to Saturday 16th March. The group met at 6pm Friday evening where they set up for the evening. Thankfully, they managed to assemble their tents fast enough before the heavens opened an hour later. Despite the rain, it did not dampen the spirits of the silver crew who were determined to enjoy their evening before their expedition walk the next day.

Over night, a few car alarms kept us awake however we still managed to rise out of bed at 6am the next day. By 7:30am, the group had got up and ready for the day, made their breakfast using the camping stoves to good effect. Miss Davies made a very nice burger whilst the majority of us enjoyed pots of porridge.

The starting point of the practice expedition was in Icklingham. They started their route by 8am and navigated their way to their first checkpoint successfully with no breaks. The second part of their route was the longest stretch at just over 6km long, here the group showed excellent teamwork and completed this section in 1 hour and 30 minutes, which is a fast pace considering the bags they were carrying along the muddy footpaths

which they endured. Unfortunately, some of the footpaths we had planned to use are currently closed for repairs so a little re-routing from Mr Goodenough and Mr Waterson lead the group up to Elveden.

From here the group were driven down to West Row to finish the day walking along the river back to Mildenhall College Academy. Overall, it was a very successful D of E practice expedition with some excellent navigation skills from Rowen Ives keeping the team on track. Next challenge is the silver expedition from Friday 19th - Sunday 21st of April, which is a much tougher challenge along the North Norfolk coastline with sand dunes and more challenging navigational skills to conquer.

Tower of London Visit





On Wednesday 13th March we went on the Year 8 History trip to London where we visited many interesting locations, each as rich in history as the one before. This trip was the second one organised by the academy as it was so popular.

After a two hour bus journey we arrived at the Tower of London and were given our wristband entry passes. We were split into smaller groups and our group went to see the crown jewels first of all. We saw many extravagant items, such as royal robes worn at the Coronation, the ancient anointing spoon – called an antique when first recorded in 1349, remarkable golden punch bowls and many other crowns and diamond encrusted royal items.

After this, we headed to Tower Green and walked the different walls and tower rooms as well as going inside the White Tower. To stay focused we were asked to count how many horses legs were in the White Tower. For future Year 8s who may go on this trip, the answer was 68!

After the Tower of London we headed for our tour around London linking to the history of Tudor and Stuart times. We kept stumbling on many tourist attractions, such as the Monument to the Great Fire of London, London Bridge, the Golden Hinde, the Globe Theatre, the Millennium Bridge

and St Paul's Cathedral. At each sightseeing point we were given a small talk on its historical significance. This walk gave us some fantastic photos — especially crossing the Thames and the view to Tower Bridge. After our dinner at McDonalds we reached the best part of the trip in my opinion — Six the Musical. It is a modern version of the stories of Henry VIII's six wives. Each wife has a solo song telling her story and the finale song was one we were allowed to record. The whole experience was phenomenal, exceptional and exhilarating.

The Woman in Black Trip

On Wednesday 6th March, GCSE students took a trip to the Ipswich Regent Theatre to watch the matinee performance of The Woman in Black in preparation for their written GCSE exam in May.



The Woman in Black is a thriller which put all the audience on the edge of their seats as we found out more about the ghost who had been haunting the residents of a small village.

Originally written as a novel in 1983 by Susan Hill, it was then adapted into a play in 1987 by Stephen Mallatratt. It is the second longest-running non-musical play in West End history and is currently touring the country. Students thoroughly enjoyed the show and were inspired by the use of many dramatic techniques used throughout. The Woman in Black is a minimalist production which heavily relies on the audience's use of imagination.

We all had a brilliant day and our students represented the academy spectacularly through their theatre etiquette and enthusiasm for the show.

The Woman in Black was a good play. I was able to create a vivid memory in my head for what the performance looked like so I can remember it for my exam. The play had many memorable moments such as the backdrop which changed depending on the scene as it would fade in and out of the scenes. The backdrop's best part was when it showed a baby nursery. The backdrop

then hid this and then later disappeared to show the nursey destroyed. The sounds used throughout the performance, especially the baby music and the rocking chair noise, helped to create the scary eerie atmosphere throughout the play. The use of multi-purpose props was also very creative and unique by using a box as a horse and cart, a bed, a table and many other things to encourage the audience to use their imagination.

Scene changes as well as costume changes were slick and clearly showed when the location had changed as well as when the actors had switched from one character to another through multi-rolling. The use of multi-rolling was really effective and made for a high impact performance. Alienation techniques such as the actors walking through the audience whilst ignoring us created a really tense and exciting atmosphere throughout the performance. Sound effects and lighting added tension and fear throughout the whole show and kept the audience hooked. Both the red gel spotlights and eerie music allowed for some very effective jump scares! The story flowed nicely and the actors use of gestures and other acting techniques allowed us audience members to use our imagination to enhance the performance even further. With a spooky plot twist at the end of the show, I was left full of excitement and questions about 'The Woman in Black'. A must watch performance in my opinion, so creepy and creative!



A huge shoutout to Lucy Pinnell in Year 11 who achieved a Gold Award on her UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge and has been invited to participate in the next round of UKMT competitions last week. In a few weeks' time, students will be paid a visit by two engineers from Optimise Heat and Steam who will come into MCA and talk about their experiences in their field and how they use maths in their jobs. As an academy, as well as a faculty, we recognise the importance of exposing students to different career options, and the many paths available to them after their GCSEs. Optimise will talk to students about apprenticeship opportunities, as well as give students the chance to ask questions and for any advice. For those students who would like to learn about a practical application of maths in the real world, or for those who need clarity on "when will I use this?" the engineering visit will provide a great insight into the importance of our curriculum and where they may take their knowledge in the future.


Unfortunately, a quick throw in from Samuel Ward led to a good goal and we went into half time 1-0 down.



In these instances we will contact you for a decision about whether your child comes home or stays in the academy. We try to encourage students to remain in the academy accessing their learning unless they are too unwell.

In any eventuality students must go to student reception for us to contact you and not make contact themselves as mobile phone use is not permitted. If your child has a long term or temporary condition affecting their ability to be in the academy as normal or where we need to be aware for their safety and comfort please contact your child's House Leader who will arrange a meeting and where necessary an individual health care plan.
