

Well done, Year 8, what a great start to your Food rotation!







English Faculty

Duke of Edinburgh Silver Expedition



From Thursday 13th March until Saturday 15th March it was the Year 11 students' time to embark on their D of E silver practice expedition. This was, and is every year, a tough one as the students attend school on Thursday and Friday, as well as camp out both nights whilst completing an expedition walk on the Friday evening and Saturday morning.

The students arrived at 6pm on Thursday 13th, in full spirit and prepared for the days ahead. Well, that Thursday had seen wind up to 48mph, and, unfortunately wasn't letting up for the students. The first challenge of putting the tents up was a tough one with the wind constantly blowing big gusts which made it particularly difficult. Here, the students showed great togetherness, aiding each other in putting everyone's tents up, with all of them doing one tent at a time to ensure they didn't get blown away! This was a much longer process than usual, but the students pulled together well and worked as a great team! After the tents were up, the students had a chance to relax, either by playing table tennis or just chilling and talking.

Come 10pm, the students made their way to bed for an early night before school the next day. However, the weather had other ideas that night, with the winds as strong as ever, the tents, thankfully were pegged down well which meant that they were going nowhere although they were still taking a good beating. As well as this, at 1am it started to pour down for a few hours, which meant the students got very little sleep overall.

The students were up early the next morning by 7am, and due to the weather everyone was feeling tired and a little worse for wear! By 8:15 everyone was up, changed and ready to go to school, showing great resilience after a tough night.

After school, the students got ready for their first walk, which they had to start quickly to finish before it started getting dark. Here the walk was from MCA to West Row, then around West Row.

This was a walk in the park for the students. Who managed to get to each check point ahead of time with very little breaks, despite being at school all day off very little sleep. The students stopped via Sainsburys on their way back to school, for a chance to buy some more food/snacks which the students took full advantage of. We got back to camp by 6:30pm where the students had a chance to make some food, and chill out for the evening. During the evening Mrs Davies put on her fire pit, which several of the students enjoyed roasting marshmallows on and it helped them keep warm outside as the temperature started to drop. The rest of the students enjoyed playing games in the common room.

Overnight, the temperature dropped so that there was ice on the tents in the mornings, which meant the students had to wrap up warm to enjoy a good nights sleep. Nevertheless, students generally slept better than the first night. All students were up and ready to leave camp by 8:15 the next day, we headed to the first drop off point in Icklingham and the students successfully navigated their way to the next checkpoint in West Stow. From there, the students headed North up to Elveden, successfully navigating their way around with ease.

The students walked with pace and purpose, finishing ahead of schedule, meaning by 1pm the students were back to MCA packing away tents and then going home for a restful rest of the weekend.

Overall, the students completed the expedition with ease despite the conditions overnight, a perfect set up to their Silver Qualifying expedition next month along the North Norfolk Coast.






Game 1: MCA 3-0 Newmarket

MCA faced Newmarket in the first round of the West Suffolk cup. Mildenhall looked to start on the front foot with some promising attacks forcing the Newmarket goalkeeper into some good saves and some close efforts just shaving the goal frame. Mildenhall did not have to wait long to break the deadlock when Kaitlin Manuel's strike from the edge of the box took a wicked deflection, wrong footing the Newmarket keeper and putting the girls into a 1-0 lead. Mildenhall's dominance continued, limiting Newmarket to only one shot on target and goals a lovely side footed finish to round the keeper from Ellecia Paflin doubled the host's advantage. Mildenhall were rewarded with a third courtesy of Imogen Radford to secure a well deserved and dominant 3-0 victory in the opening game of the day.

Game 2: MCA 0-0 Breckland

Heading into the final game of the day, the scores were level after Breckland had also defeated Newmarket 3-0. Mildenhall faced a much greater opposition in Breckland who made life much harder for Mildenhall, forcing Ella Brewer in goal into action more and testing Sophia Coker and Brooke Gathercole's resolve in defence. Ultimately the sides could not be split and the game finished in a 0-0 draw, forcing the tie to a penalty shootout. In a best of 3 format both sides converted with 100% accuracy to send it to sudden death. Despite multiple chances to win it from the spot, the Breckland goalkeeper stood firm to deny 3 of Mildenhall's attempts, sending Breckland through as shootout winners.

U15 Boys Futsal Finals



On Thursday 26th February the U15 boys futsal team travelled to Suffolk New College to compete in the Suffolk futsal finals. In their opening game MCA put on a dominant display beating a strong Sir John Lemman High School side 5-1. Goals from Reggie Maynard gave the Mildenhall boys a strong foothold in the game. Despite a nervy few minutes after Sir John Lemman pulled one back, a quickfire double from Joe Alexander and an unorthodox off-the-back- finish from Max Rutter off a corner secured all 3 points and +4 on goal difference.

Game 2 saw a frustrating 3-3 draw vs Thurston after having a commanding 3-0 lead. A Tobias Barrett double and well taken finish from Joe Alexander looked as though MCA were establishing a 100% record from their first 2 games. A special mention to goal of the day - Charlie Butler sailed an overarm throw from his goal line direct to the right foot of Tobias Barrett who whipped a sidewinder into the bottom corner on the half volley! Frustratingly, Thurston drew level with a flurry of goals at the end of the game giving MCA just a point from their second game.

U14 Basketball- Second Round of the National Cup



On Tuesday 3rd March it was the second round of the National finals for the U14 basketball team. The boys have already done incredibly well to get as far as they have and they were all raring to go for the fixture. Their opponents were Ormiston Park Academy, who are from East London and travelled a couple hours via bus to make the journey.

The game started quick, with Ormiston coming out quickly from the blocks, going up 10-3 early on dominating early plays. It took a little while for MCA to get into the game but once they did they got on a roll fairly quickly. Riley Warren's 3 pointers along with Emil's sharp shooting in the key helped MCA come back to go into the second quarter 19 - 18 in the lead, a remarkable turnaround. The lads really pulled together, fighting hard for every point. The second quarter started, and once again Ormiston started quickly, building up a commanding lead. A timeout was called with 4 minutes left until half time, to break the flow of their play. After this and a few changes, the remaining minutes was a much more even affair. End of the second quarter we were 24 - 44 down. At half time, we knew we were getting beat however we knew we could get back into it.



The third quarter started and it was a very even affair, with an even number of baskets being scored at each end. Good defending from MCA managed to slow their scoring down, with good points being scored from Sean Doyle enabling MCA to stay in the game. The third quarter was tied at 19 - 19, game score being 43 - 63. The final quarter started, and it was important that we left it all on the court, with MCA trying their absolute best to win all their individual battles and play well as a team. MCA managed to score a few good baskets and make some good plays, however overall were outplayed by Ormiston Park. Final score was MCA 60 - 90 Ormiston Park.

The boys done themselves so proud to get to where they got to. Winners of the Suffolk County championships and coming through the first round of the National Cup, playing some tremendous basketball along the way. This is just a learning curve and they will comeback stronger next year.

U18 Football

MCA 6th Form hosted Hartismere in the quarter final of the under 18 cup. Hartismere made the better side and were almost 1-0 instantly but were stopped at the last minute by a combination of Charlie Butler and Joao Carvalho. Hartismere did take the lead in the 10th minute with a driven low shot that gave Jack Hardinge no chance. MCA then began to get a hold of the ball and after good work from Charlie Butler down the right hand side, MCA won a corner. Max Rose's delivery was flicked on at the near post and allowed Rhys Horrex to tap home at the back post to make it 1-1. The game was then very even but Hartismere did have the majority of the possession. After good play through the midfield a flicked header struck the hand of Joao Carvalho and Hartismere were awarded a penalty and despite Jack Hardinge's best efforts the ball ended up in the back of the MCA net. Reggie Maynard then began to get a hold of the midfield battle and played through Rhys Horrex whose driven shot whistled over the bar. As MCA pushed to get back into the game Hartismere grabbed a third slightly against the run of play.

MCA then pulled one back after a good run from Harry Williams, his pass found Reggie Maynard who played through Joshua Sole-Stevens and after a scramble the ball was tucked home only for the offside flag to cut short MCA's celebrations.

They thought they had second after great pressing from Bailey Gibbs the goalkeeper gifted the ball to him but he couldn't capitalise on this error. With the last kick of the 1st half Hartismere scored a fourth after CA tried to play out of the back and were caught out. 4-1 at halftime.

MCA started the second half brilliantly and a stinging drive was excellently tipped over by the Hartismere goalkeeper.

Bailey Gibbs then saw his shot fly past the post after great work from Harry Willaims down the left. MCA looked defensively much more solid thanks to the excellent work of Peter Martin and Charlie Butler. After two minutes of play, a strong move down the left from Jasmine Gee created the chance for Nell Pearce to level the score. MCA continued to build momentum, and another fast break saw Jasmine find Rachel Groves in space in the key, where she finished confidently to give MCA a 4–2 lead. The girls defended well to protect their advantage and secured their first win of the day. The second match saw MCA face Castle Manor, and the team started strongly, scoring four quick points through Martha Harwood and Nell. Castle Manor responded to bring the game back to 4–4, but MCA stayed composed. A well taken shot from Evelyn Howard restored the lead and lifted the team. 



For Good Mental Health



We have a number of first aid qualified staff in the academy who are able to respond to any emergencies. Most of the time we are dealing with students who have a headache or who feel unwell in a general sense. In these instances we will contact parents / carers to gain permission for a paracetamol to be given or to inform that a child feels unwell. If a child feels unwell we will offer a drink of water and something to eat if appropriate. We are not able to offer medical care beyond this as we do not have the medical expertise or facilities to do this. In these instances we will contact you for a decision about whether your child comes home or stays in the academy. We try to encourage students to remain in the academy accessing their learning unless they are too unwell.

In any eventuality students must go to student reception for us to contact you and not make contact themselves as mobile phone use is not permitted. If your child has a long term or temporary condition affecting their ability to be in the academy as normal or where we need to be aware for their safety and comfort please contact your child's House Leader who will arrange a meeting and where necessary an individual health care plan.
